



TOTAL DOLLARS RAISED \$5,511,526








TOTAL NET ASSETS GROWTH

ENDOWMENT GROWTH



FSC DEDICATES NEW TECHNOLOGY LAB

Murray Pasternack '60 Funds Radio Frequency and Microwave Technology Lab for Student Learning and Innovation

Farmingdale State College (FSC) recently dedicated the Murray Pasternack '60 Lab for Radio Frequency and Microwave Technology, unveiled during a ribbon-cutting ceremony to also celebrate his \$1.4 million gift to FSC, the largest gift made by an individual in the College's history. Previously he provided two, \$500,000 gifts to support the launch of an honors program at the College.

The lab will enable students to train using industry-leading equipment including vector network analyzers, spectrum analyzers, RF signal generators, noise sources, mixed domain oscilloscopes, and more. RF components are the active and passive parts that are used to assemble wireless receivers and transmitters. These components are used in many diverse applications including radio, TV, radar, GPS, cell towers, and medical electronics.

"It was important to me that we build a lab where we can train the next generation in this technology," said Pasternack, who is the founder and CEO of Pasternack Enterprises, a world-class supplier of radio frequency and microwave components. "The need for wireless is growing at a time when the number of engineers is decreasing. I aim to reverse the trend."

The lab now provides students with upgraded radio frequency and microwave technology equipment and will support new course offerings for the Electrical Engineering Technology Department in the School of Engineering Technology making it a leader in educating the RF engineers.

"Murray's gift has modernized and expanded a program that addresses the needs of today's high technology firms, on Long Island and beyond," said FSC President John S. Nader. "His commitment to creating opportunities for our students is inspiring, and we are grateful for his generosity."

Pasternack's interests include building a pipeline of engineers needed to meet the rapidly growing workforce demands of a dynamic and growing industry, including in-demand jobs on Long Island.

"One of the companies I've invested in is just down the street from Farmingdale, and we need excellent engineers to succeed, so this is a good arrangement for everyone. Farmingdale educates them in my lab, then we can hire them on after graduation."

"Like every great engineer and philanthropist, Murray identifies opportunities to 'fix things' or make them better and sees giving as a tool to propel the College forward," said Matthew Colson, vice president of development & alumni engagement at FSC. "We are so grateful to have him set an example of how extraordinary philanthropy can improve outcomes for students."

REMEMBERING A RUNNING LEGACY

Alumnus Frank Geremia '62 leaves gift of \$1M to FSC

Frank Geremia '62 had a few passions. One was running, which he did regularly on the Nold Athletic Complex track. A second was the stock market, which he followed vigilantly. Another, for which he harbored a deep devotion, was his alma mater, Farmingdale State College (FSC).

The depth of that devotion became clear in September 2021 when Geremia passed away a month short of his 94th birthday, and it was revealed that he had left \$1 million in his estate to the Farmingdale College Foundation.

"He had a strong feeling of gratitude and loyalty to the college that enabled him to get an education and have a rewarding career at Grumman," said his attorney and long-time friend Willis B. Carman, Jr.

"Frank's long-time relationship with Farmingdale is a reminder that alumni engagement and pride can take many forms. It isn't always driven by the institution, but rather by the individual's fond memories and personal passions," said Matthew Colson, vice president of development and alumni engagement at FSC. "Frank found a way to demonstrate his love for Farmingdale in a very personal way, that will continue to live on in his memory."

The gift will endow the Frank Geremia '62 Honors Scholarship for Business, in recognition of his interest in the stock market. It will support 20 students in the Honors Program majoring in business. Funds also will help the Alumni Association develop programming to inspire alumni like Geremia to stay connected, informed, and

engaged to their alma mater. Finally, upgrades to fitness facilities in Nold Athletic Complex will bear his name, house additional equipment, and meet the growing demands of fitness-minded students.

"Frank felt a real connection to Farmingdale and sports were a big part of that. He loved the athletes and the coaches. This is where he felt at home," said Thomas Azzara, director of athletics at FSC. Geremia's devotion to running, often when the FSC track team was practicing, prompted the student athletes to cheer him on.

"Uncle Frank loved telling us how he continued running track into his 90s — very often at Farmingdale," according to his niece Barbara Trilling. "The younger runners would say to him, 'Well done, Grandpa!"

Geremia served in the U.S. Army from 1945 to 1947 in Germany, according to Trilling. "He loved wearing his World War II veteran cap," she said. After earning his associate degree in mechanical engineering technology at FSC, he went on to a successful career at Grumman. Friends said he also did some work for NASA and travelled internationally as a consultant.

"We are all so very proud of our Uncle Frank and his legacy to Farmingdale," said Trilling. "I do know that the time he spent there, both as a student and as an athlete, were the most important moments of his long life."

Azzara said, "I didn't realize what we meant to him. He really did love Farmingdale."

"Supporting education is a core pillar of Yardi's corporate philanthropy. We believe in the life-changing impact of a college degree, especially for first-generation scholars, and we are thrilled to partner with Farmingdale State College to help these students achieve their goals," said Senior Vice President, Jay Shobe.

There will be two incoming Yardi Scholars awarded each year for the next four years. The funding is to be applied directly to tuition, fees, room and board. Students who are eligible to receive the scholarship must intend to major in, or a discipline related to, business or computer science broadly defined; have a minimum cumulative high school average of 85; and demonstrate additional financial need as reflected by their tuition balance after federal and state financial aid awards as determined by filling out the HESC and/or FAFSA application(s). Additionally, Yardi Scholars are likely to be the first to attend college in their immediate family and to have backgrounds that will contribute to the diversity of the student body in their chosen program.



FERRO FOUNDATION POWERS FORWARD, ENDOWS CLARK GILLIES SCHOLARSHIP AT FSC

Farmingdale State College (FSC) has been awarded a \$25,000 gift from the Ferro Foundation, which will support FSC students as well as increased recruitment and retention efforts for the College, beginning in Fall 2023.

The scholarship was established with funding secured by the Ferro Foundation through the Clark Gillies Foundation, in honor and memory of the many contributions National Hockey League (NHL) legend Clark Gillies made to Long Island, both on and off the ice.

"We are enormously grateful to receive this wonderful, student-focused gift," said John S. Nader, PhD, president of Farmingdale State College. "It is a genuine reflection of the selfless spirit shared by two exceptional Long Islanders: Sal Ferro, an exemplary alum and remarkable citizen, and Clark Gillies, a charismatic force of greatness in the NHL, in our community and among his family and friends."

Founded by FSC Alumnus Sal Ferro '84, former Alure Home Improvements' President and CEO and now Town of Huntington Councilman, the Ferro Foundation is a non-profit corporation established in 2017 to help Long Islanders in need, with a focus on students, seniors, and veterans. Its mission is to make a lasting and positive difference in the lives of deserving Long Islanders in need, while inspiring others to do the same.

Known as "The Power Forward," Clark Gillies was a Hockey Hall of Famer and four-time Stanley Cup champion with the New York Islanders. In early 2022, he passed away suddenly at age 67. He is remembered by many as a friend to everyone, a tower of strength on the ice, and a pillar of the Long Island community.

Gillies was committed to the region both during his playing career and after. He began The Clark Gillies Foundation, a non-profit organization developed to help children who are physically, developmentally, or financially challenged. Its goal is to improve their quality of life; and 100 percent of its proceeds go directly to people in need.

"Over the years, Clark has helped so many. He has been a role model and inspiration for me. He taught me so much about the giving spirit and social responsibility," said Ferro, who is also a member of the Farmingdale College Foundation Board of Directors. "It means so much to me to set up a scholarship in Clark's name for Farmingdale State College."

Looking ahead, the Ferro Foundation plans to grow the Clark Gillies Scholarship into a \$50,000 endowment in the coming years. This is the second endowed scholarship and third gift funded by the Ferro Foundation with the Farmingdale College Foundation. In May 2021, the Ferro Foundation made a \$50,000 contribution to create The Ferro Family Scholarship supporting Farmingdale Business students. In 2019, Ferro established a fund to help FSC students purchase textbooks.

FARMINGDALE FOUNDATION FUNDS BIOSCIENCE AQUARIUM LAB

On September 26, 2023, Farmingdale State College (FSC) proudly unveiled its state-of-the-art new Bioscience Aquarium Laboratory after an intensive two-year construction process. Located in Gleeson Hall's lower level in room L104, the newly renovated space boasts an array of advanced equipment provided by some of the region's top vendors.

The \$45,000 lab renovation was funded by the Farmingdale College Foundation with the generous support of the Broadhollow Bioscience Park.

"This investment will enhance the FSC student experience and advance faculty research capabilities" said Matthew Colson, vice president of development and alumni engagement. "We are thrilled to make this wonderful asset available to the campus community."

"The Aquarium facility is an outstanding new resource for the Biology Department and the greater Farmingdale campus community, and will serve as a phenomenal research, teaching, and learning tool for our faculty and students," said Sarah Gross, chair of biology. "I am so excited to see it up and running after all of the months of planning and hard work."

The new lab includes photosynthetic lighting, a unique textured floor for extra traction, new cabinetry, mobile lab benches, an industrial sink, state-of-the-art electronics including auto-top offs, water alarms, and in-lab cameras and specialized equipment "windows."

"Often, all the mechanisms in any type of aquarium are hidden from view in models sold for fish markets and supermarkets for aesthetic reasons," said Biology Professor Peter Park. "However, because teaching was the central focus of this tank, it was custom-built-top-to-bottom so that every working component, such as the protein skimmer, filtration unit, pump, chiller, and UV sterilizer, has its own window or

access space such that each part can be viewed by students separately for teaching purposes. Now, students will be able to see this process in real-time."

Several local vendors played a huge part in the new lab as well, including Chris Downs and his team at Island Fish & Reef in Bohemia, who installed the freshwater flow-through system, saltwater aquarium system, and frog tank; Tom Olsen and his team at Lobster Life Systems, Inc. in Lodi, NJ, who service the lobster tanks at many Long Island supermarkets and who installed the customized teaching marine touch tank; and Captain Gregory Peter Lauda, "Captain Pete," of Target Rock Charters, who provided two live lobsters he had just caught in the Long Island Sound near Huntington Bay.

The lab will be available to various research interns and undergraduate students enrolled in Bio131 (Biological Principles II), Bio135 (Marine Science), and Bio310 (Ichthyology).


"We think that the aquarium will bring to light just how lucky we are to live on Long Island," said Biology Professor Amanda Shore. "We firmly believe that there is no better place in the world to teach marine biology, freshwater biology, and fish biology. We are surrounded by water--estuaries, rivers and streams, lakes and ponds, and the Atlantic Ocean. This room will allow us to bring some of that nature back to the FSC campus."

"This room sets the stage for various research projects that will involve marine and freshwater animals," agreed Park. "It will be at the center of studies that aim to answer questions and solve real problems that face us here in Long Island. It will open doors to conversations about local wildlife and it will allow students to empathize with the nature that already and immensely surrounds Long Island."

Trinity Jackson was a senior at Farmingdale State College, majoring in Science, Technology and Society who plans on joining an accelerated nursing program in pursuit of one day becoming a PA. With a current GPA of 3.79, Jackson has been an active student, working in the Academic Advisement and Information Center as well as in the tutoring center as a peer mentor. Last spring, she received the Student Service Award for her outstanding efforts in helping other students.

"I come from a single parent household where my mother worked tirelessly to get me through college. She taught me that education was the most important thing that you can get out of life, because it will create opportunities. Due to medical issues, the financial burden of college became very difficult, and I worried about how we would be able to afford it. I have been truly blessed with assistance that will allow me to graduate in Fall 2022. When I walk across the stage, I will be the first-generation college graduate in my family, thanks to the emergency fund", said Jackson.

Angelica Britez was a junior at Farmingdale State College who aspires to be an accountant. She started as a Criminal Justice Major but switched to Business Management after taking an accounting course during her freshman year. She plans to further her education at SUNY Old Westbury in their Accounting Master's program after graduation.

"My life at home led me to move out for my own safety and mental health. Doing so created many obstacles, including having to pay for college on my own. With the help of the emergency fund, I will graduate in December 2023 and earn a degree that I've been working towards for the last three years. Thank you for helping me finish. I am extremely grateful. I cannot thank all who supported the emergency fund enough," said Britez.

"These sentiments speak for themselves, and truly capture the impact corporate giving can make in people's lives," said Linda Armyn, chief strategy & marketing officer, Bethpage. "Bethpage is a longtime supporter of Farmingdale State College as an institution committed to catapulting students to a bright future. We are honored to have a role in helping these deserving students get the

Hosted by the Farmingdale College Foundation and Department of Athletics at Hempstead Golf and Country Club in Hempstead, the 2023 Farmingdale State College (FSC) Golf Classic was a swinging success. A sold-out outing of more than 130 golfers teed off at this year's event, which raised almost \$120,000 for the College.

This year's Golf Classic honored Marty Lyons and The Marty Lyons Foundation (MLF). Based in Bay Shore, NY, the foundation was founded in 1982 by Lyons, who at the time was an NFL player with the New York Jets. From its first day, MLF's mission has been to grant special wishes for children ages 3-17 years old diagnosed with a terminal or life-threatening illness.

"It is our distinct honor to highlight Marty Lyons, the Marty Lyons Foundation and the noble work they do making wishes a reality for children, at a time when they are experiencing profoundly challenging medical issues," said FSC President John S. Nader, PhD. "The Marty Lyons Foundation's inspiring work is transformational for them and their families.

"I decided to use my name and my God-given talent to make a difference in the lives of terminally ill children," said Lyons of his drive to found MLF in March 1982, when he was a Big Brother to a little boy who passed away from leukemia at only 3 years old.

Today, MLF has 11 chapters covering 14 states, hundreds of volunteers, granted over 8,300 wishes and raised over \$43,000,000. Nearly 75 cents from every dollar donated goes directly to granting a wish, which on average costs \$6,500 and can range from Disney vacations, cruises, concert tickets or Broadway shows, to meeting sports heroes, the fun of a shopping spree, to room makeovers or the critical gift of special medical beds or other medical equipment.

On Long Island, MLF has 16 outstanding wishes to be granted but is on course to grant one more. The Farmingdale College Foundation has announced its pledge to support sending a 7-year-old boy from Lindenhurst to Walt Disney World with his family through MLF.

"It is very rewarding to support the Marty Lyons
Foundation, and to celebrate our shared commitment
to serving the greater Long Island region and beyond,"
said Matthew Colson, vice president of development and
alumni engagement for FSC. "They truly grant wishes
today for a better tomorrow and we could not be more
pleased to have them as this year's FSC Golf Classic
honoree."




